**I.** The "Department of Government Efficiency" (DOGE) was created by US President Donald Trump on the day of his inauguration. In the Executive Order. <u>Link to document</u>

The former "United States Digital Service" will be renamed "United States DOGE Service (USDS)" and will be located in the Office of the President. A USDS-Administrator will be established in the executive branch and will be part of the White House staff. In this agency, a temporary organization known as "the USA DOGE Service Temporary Organization" will be established. The "USA DOGE Service Temporary Organization" is managed by the USDS and is expected to complete its work in 18 months.

DOGE teams have been set up very quickly in all US federal agencies, which are given considerable tasks and competences. Each DOGE team consists of at least the DOGE Team Lead, an engineer, a human resources specialist, and a lawyer. The heads of the federal authorities are obliged to work closely with these teams.

**II.** In another Presidential Order, dated 19. February 2025, details of the working methods of the new agency are now described for the first time. Link to document. This document sets out for the first time concrete criteria for the selection of the rules to be reviewed and, if necessary, abolished.

Quote: "Agency heads shall, in coordination with their DOGE Team Leads and the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, initiate a process to review all regulations subject to their sole or joint jurisdiction for consistency with law and Administration policy. Within 60 days of the date of this order, agency heads shall, in consultation with the Attorney General as appropriate, identify the following classes of regulations:

- (i) <u>unconstitutional regulations and regulations that raise serious constitutional difficulties</u>, such as exceeding the scope of the power vested in the Federal Government by the Constitution;
- (ii) regulations that are based on <u>unlawful delegations of legislative</u> <u>power;</u>
- (iii) regulations that are based on <u>anything other than the best reading</u> <u>of the underlying statutory authority</u> or prohibition;
- (iv) regulations that implicate <u>matters of social</u>, <u>political</u>, <u>or economic</u> <u>significance that are not authorized</u> by clear statutory authority;
- (v) regulations that impose significant costs upon private parties that are not outweighed by public benefits;
- (vi) regulations that harm the national interest in significantly and unjustifiably impeding technological innovation, infrastructure development, disaster response, inflation reduction, research and development, economic development, energy production, land use, and foreign policy objectives; and
- (vii) regulations that impose <u>undue burdens on small business</u> and impede private enterprise and entrepreneurship. Within 60 days of the date of this order, agency heads shall provide to the Administrator of the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA) within the Office of Management and Budget a list of all regulations identified by class as listed in subsection (a) of this section."

**III.** But in addition to the general reviews, it is also about the closure of numerous, according to the US president's assessments "superfluous institutions and bodies", which he closes with another order with immediate effect. Link to document
